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

After eighteen months of visiting outdoor parks, going on long country walks and bus rides we have at last been able to re-instate our favourite community leisure centres back into the timetable. Cycles4all, Atmosphere (the old Jump Factory) and Camp Mohawk are all up and running and we are now enjoying weekly trips for our children and young people to these leisure centres.

To re-introduce Atmosphere to all children we booked a private 2hour session in September. The lights in the café were switched off, staff manned the exits and 24 of our students managed the short journey and a jump session. A handful of students stayed the full two hours. This was a wonderful occasion for both staff and children. A lovely feeling that things were starting to edge forward. The staff at the centre were so impressed with the engagement of the children and the tremendous encouragement support staff gave.

Outdoor Learning

Many opportunities this term to learn outdoors with our timetabled work in Horticulture and Forest schools and in the Paddocks. We added some national special days – Apple Day – to celebrate the harvest of the English Apple.



We continue to use the nature trail for numeracy, PE, Story time and Environmental Phonics, listening and looking, and recording.



Daily walks in the school, the fields and local community have been plentiful during the good early autumn weather.





The new houses are providing good access to a courtyard and grassed area which has been a good place for learning. Numeracy when the sun is shining, allowing our students to be relaxed and therefore more willing to engage with learning tasks for extended periods of time.



Using numicom pieces our students are helped to change the abstract concept of number into a concrete shape allowing them to understand numbers better and transfer this learning to help with everyday tasks.

Numeracy, Literacy and Science

Following the Early reading, writing and mathematics framework our students continue to enjoy and engage with a variety of learning activities which develop their communication skills, phonetics, explore books, develop mark making and writing skills, discover number properties and mathematics patterns and sequences. Staff are highly creative using a wide variety of resources to develop this learning.



Students learn to recognise numbers and to sort objects related to a particular number – very useful skill when shopping or following a recipe. Learning the shapes of numbers, placing them in order while also using fine motor skills to align puzzle pieces makes enjoying puzzles a great learning and skill development task.



During national science week the school joined in the event with a week of science exploration using a wide variety of resources. The room was dark one day while the students explored stars and shiny objects. Other days focused on the planets, the sun, and space travel. It was wonderful watching the students move around the library exploring the different stations. Many staying for extensive periods of time.
